

About DAWN

DAWN is Reboot's all-night interpretation of the magical and mighty holiday of Shavuot. We spend the night immersed in music, comedy, food, learning and conversation – all presented by some of the greatest artists, rabbis and thinkers of our generation. For years, Reboot gathered people in person, but in 2020, the pandemic shut down forced us to take the tradition online, connecting people across the world for disparate experiences together.

This year, we are offering highlights from past two online DAWN festivals and a marquee performance, "Round Midnight Reconsidered" by Bay Area guitarist composer John Schott. Reboot presented DAWN 2021 in partnership with the Jewish Emergent Network and LABA's Into the Night Tikkun Layle Shavuot and DAWN 2020 in partnership with the Jewish Emergent Network.

Discussion Questions

- 1. William DeMeritt ponders all of the customs, celebrations, and stories that make up the identity of Shavuot, and finds the parallels between that and his own identity. What are some of the pieces that make up your identity?
- 2. The customs of Shavuot have evolved over time. How have your traditions and rituals changed throughout your life?
- 3. What makes your Jewish identity unique?

Discussion Questions

- 1. Shavuot celebrates when the Jews received the Torah and the Ten Commandments at Mount Sinai. If you were to add a commandment, what would it be?
- 2. While many people know of the Ten Commandments, the Torah actually contains 613 commandments in total, laying out the practices of Jewish society in the time and place that they were written. What is outdated? Which ones could our society today benefit from?
- 3. What art form would you use to create a Shavuot piece?

Discussion Questions

- 1. How familiar were you with Shavuot prior to this year? What practices were you aware of, and what is new to you?
- 2. What do you think of this tradition of staying up all night? Do you have any unique rituals that you observe on Shavuot or other holidays?
- 3. Rabbi Elliot Cosgrove compares the celebration of Shavuot to reading and re-reading a love letter each year, searching for further meanings. What are you revisiting this Shavuot? What are you exploring deeper?

Discussion Questions

- 1. If you plan to stay up all night for Shavuot, how will you mark the dawn?
- 2. According to the Talmud, on the morning the Israelites were to receive the Torah they overslept. Now to make up for our tardiness, we remain awake and study the Torah. What are some other reasons you have stayed up all night?
- 3. Like many Jewish holidays, Shavuot marks an important point in the agricultural calendar, and occurs at a time of year when the days are long and the nights are short. Are there midsummer/solstice holidays or rituals from other traditions that remind you of Shavuot?
