Kol Nidre

Traditionally, Kol Nidre is presented in three parts. Inspired by Reboot's commitment to the arts, each rendition is performed by leading voices of the theatre.

 cello and clarinet.





Yom Kippur

- Ashmanu by Rachel Fleit, sung by Cantor Jen Cohen An acrostic of sins interpreted by Reboot's artists.
- <u>Separated: An American Tragedy by Jacob Soboroff (NBC News and MSNBC correspondent) and Brina Milikowsky (political strategist)</u> Discussion of family separation at the US-Mexico border, inspired by the idea of scapegoats introduced in the Yom Kippur Haftorah portion.
- <u>Forgiveness by Aaron Samuels</u> A visual poem from Aaron Samuels that invites
 the listener to reflect upon our shortcomings and enter a period of **repair**,
 atonement, and forgiveness.

Forgiveness

Forgiveness explores the **transitional spiritual space** that we enter on Kol Nidre when we move from Rosh Hashanah to Yom Kippur as part of a larger transition from one year to the next. The visual poem invites the listener to question their own processes of **atonement** and **forgiveness**. Alongside the short film is a post-film talkback between the filmmaker, poet and Blavity cofounder Aaron Samuels and Mahogany L. Browne, executive director of Just Media and Poet-in-Residence at Lincoln Center. A downloadable educational guide provides discussion questions to accompany the film and talkback.
